

Greetings, Kia Ora, Talofa, Bula Vinaka, Konnichi wa, Dobrodošli, Sawa dee, Failte

Welcome back to term two! We warmly welcome our new whanau into the special community of PCS. Our staff have had great refreshment leave and have worked in the break to ensure we are ready to hit the term with lots of learning opportunities across the school. We are working hard on our well-being this year and physical fitness is on the top of the list for staff, so check out that track in Waitangi if you can. It is fabulous!

There are lots of great opportunities for our tamariki as we head in to term two. We are excited about sharing the learning and meeting with you our whanau at the end of the term for our three way conferencing.

There is so much to share with you that my Principal blurb goes over two pages, so I hope I don't bore you!!!

WHAKATAU

We began the term with a whakatau led by our senior tamariki. We are so proud of their growing confidence with their karanga, mihi and waiata. We welcomed our new teacher Miss Peyton Moro-Kirton to the Kea class, and our new students and whanau. You can get to know Miss Moro-Kirton further in the newsletter.

Term two continues with care for God's creation with Nga Kai, Te Ngahere and Te Awa. If you are able to share some knowledge in these areas please let us know as we continue to build on our local curriculum and resources.

REPORTS

We have been gathering your feedback during our whanau hui and the use of SeeSaw is the most popular source of sharing learning and notices. With this in mind, we have actioned our digital connections with you our whanau, to share learning as it happens. This can be student directed in the senior school and more teacher led in the junior school. With the ability to share "real time" learning throughout the term, we are trialling a new reporting system. In the past learning was summarised into a short paragraph, proofread, checked and sent home. The learning was often out of date as writing numerous reports takes the teacher weeks to complete. Our new trial report will now link to SeeSaw with learning across all curriculum areas with a front page summarising achievement. The teachers are constantly sharing with you, so it is now the most "up to date" picture of your child's learning and achievement. Please ensure you are connecting with SeeSaw and blogs in the senior school.

Week 9 we have our three-way conference with student, whanau, teacher. Interview times will be sent out closer to the time. The school will be closed for normal classes that day. Tuesday 29th June as we meet with whanau all day. The three-way conference is an opportunity to share questions, clarify learning with your child and their teacher. It is such a great chance to check in with the learning mid way through the year and set goals moving forward.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

You will see from our calendar that we have a teacher only day scheduled this term. It is in conjunction with local schools and our focus is on

well-being and resilience. This is a theme throughout NZ and we are looking forward to the learning as a team. All staff are attending so the school will be closed, so please make arrangements for your tamariki.

SPEECHES

This term we take part in speeches. This is something that fits in with our school curriculum and we are always very proud of the level of speakers within our school. The speech topics and criteria were sent out for all of our students at the end of term one. If you need another copy please contact your classroom teacher. The year 1 to 4 students are able to choose their topics and year 5 to 8 are set topics.

For our senior students, we take part in the Far North Speech Competition, so use the topics shared with us. Instructions, ideas and prompts have been provided for our students to write their speeches. These speeches are written as part of the home learning, and support is provided by your child's classroom teacher. Our speech competition is being held in week 3 on Thursday 20th May, so students will be speaking in their classes prior to this. Three finalists in each year level are chosen to present their speeches at our school competition. I am sure you can imagine how difficult it is to choose the finalists, so please be respectful of any decision that is made—it is tough!!!! Many of our students go on to be successful speakers so it is a great opportunity for them to practice with an authentic audience. Good luck to all!!!! It is a real talent to speak to an audience on a set topic which many of us find extremely challenging.

LUNCH IN SCHOOLS

"Lunch in schools" began this week. Every child is supplied with their own lunch. These are free and funded by the Ministry of Education. The meals are carefully planned based on healthy eating and some foods will be new for your tamariki. We encourage our students to try the range of food supplied. The feedback has been really positive with 98% of our tamariki loving the food. How blessed are we! I know as a parent, it saves one less job in the morning too! Please remember that all tamariki still need morning tea and a healthy snack for brain food at 10.00am. Water bottles each day are important too.

SPECIAL FEAST DAYS

We look forward to celebrating Ascension next week. Pentecost Sunday is also coming up in Week 3. Check in with your tamariki about the learning they are doing with these celebrations as part of our Religious Education programme. We have Family Mass on **Sunday 23rd May** which falls on Pentecost Sunday where we celebrate the Holy Spirit. We ask that all of our families and whanau attend Family Mass as our students lead the Ministries of altar service, singing, prayers and readings. It is a special chance to support your tamariki with their faith journey at our Catholic School. We bring morning tea to share with our community and appreciate your help serving in the kitchen and doing the dishes.

We keep the world, and particularly India in our prayers with the ongoing battles with Covid-19 and give thanks that NZ is safe from this pandemic and pray that this continues.

DRS COLUMN

We feel so blessed to be a Catholic school. This term we celebrate Ascension and then Pentecost soon after. As we gather together we are able to strengthen our faith and understanding. If you are able to come along to Mass with your tamariki, you too will help nurture and build the faith journey with our school and parish community.

I was scrolling through scripture to share with you and came across this, which I thought would begin term two off well. I hope you enjoy it as much as I did.

My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me." John 10:27

Like many people today, chances are you may not know any shepherds. For the first Christians, who were very familiar with shepherds, the Good Shepherd was a favourite image to associate with Christ. In fact, the earliest Christian art depicts Christ as the Good Shepherd, rather than the crucified Saviour. Often he was portrayed as a beardless youth. Surprisingly, the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd is still popular. In fact, early childhood education experts tell us that young children find the concept of a shepherd and his love for his sheep enchanting.

In the Old Testament God was called a shepherd, and God's people the flock. For instance, in Psalm 23 the psalmist sings that the shepherd leads him to green pastures near refreshing waters. The shepherd guards him in right paths and protects him from evil. God says, "I myself will pasture my sheep; I myself will give them rest. . . . The lost I will seek out, the strayed I will bring back, the injured I will bind up, the sick I will heal" (Ezekiel 34:15-16).

According to the Gospels, Jesus referred to himself as a shepherd. He said, "My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me" (John 10:27). A shepherd knows his sheep well. There is a personal relationship between Jesus and his followers. Jesus knows each of us by name. On the other hand, we respond to his voice and do not follow the voice of strangers who may lead us to harm. Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). Unlike a hired hand who flees to save his life, Jesus saved his flock from the wolf even though it meant sacrificing his own life. The parable Jesus told about the lost sheep is a story about Jesus' concern and care for us sinners. He is the loving shepherd who goes to great lengths to search for his lost sheep and when he finds it, carries it back on his shoulders rejoicing.


When Jesus gave Peter the responsibility of leading his Church, he again used shepherd imagery. He told Peter, "Feed my lambs. . . . Tend my sheep. . . . Feed my sheep" (John 21:15-17).

Knowing about shepherds sheds light on the image of Jesus as shepherd. The shepherd uses a staff with a hook on the end to guide the sheep and pull back the stray. Today Jesus guides his flock through bishops, who are known as *pastors*, the Latin for shepherds. Bishops carry staffs called crosiers. The shepherd has a rod to fend off wild animals that might harm the flock. Jesus saved us from evil.

Jesus restores our souls. Shepherds feed their flocks. Jesus feeds us with the excellent bread of the Eucharist and brings us to living waters: baptism and the Holy Spirit.

The image of shepherds is that they are kind, loving, patient, strong, and self-sacrificing. They are a good image for Jesus. And sheep, who can be rather stupid and foolish creatures, are a good symbol for us!


STAFF TERM BREAK ANTICS
